This year has been an historic one for the School. It started with the opening of our new campus in Bairnsdale, along with the establishment of a new Early Learning Centre at the St Anne's campus. Despite significant time pressures, both of these ventures were completed in time for the start of Term 1 and both have enjoyed enormous success. The Bairnsdale Campus opened with 49 students, under the daily care of Campus Co-ordinator Kate Arnup and her dedicated team of teachers. There has been a steady increase in enrolments throughout the year and the School community has been enriched by the addition of some very enthusiastic and supportive families. With enrolments increasing

in 2007 to about 90, the campus is now well and truly established and we will commence work on the phase 2 building in the early part of next year.

Our ELC Director, Lisa Burgess has presided over similar growth with the centre now full for 2007, apart from a few places in a newly established transition program. The move from our rather primitive premises into the brand-new building has been a welcome one for staff, students and parents. The new playground, bordering on York St, has itself been a great advertisement for the School.

Meanwhile, the last six months has seen the emergence of a classroom block and lecture theatre at the Garnsey Campus which will be ready for the start of 2007. This project has been made necessary by the 4–form entry cohort reaching Year 12 in 2007, giving us a significant increase in enrolments at the senior campus. Next year, total enrolments (including ELC) will exceed 1000.

The biggest highlight for 2006 has been the work and achievements of our students. Not only have there been some terrific things happening in the classrooms, but there have also been successes in competitions, the Talent Search, the National Qualifying Examinations, three students gaining selection to the next National Youth Science Forum, and of course Erika Lind's trip to England as part of a very small, select group of young Australians at the International Youth Science Forum.

This year, Mr Viv Cooper announced that he would be retiring after 31 years of service to science at Gippsland Grammar. This is certainly a loss of a wealth of experience, but we wish both him and his wife Pauline a healthy and happy retirement.

Our VCE students have again achieved outstanding results. I extend my congratulations to our Dux of the School, Oliver Scarlett, who gained an ENTER of 99.6. Some of our VCE results are included in this edition. A full report of VCE 2006 destinations will be included in the next Veritas.

2006 has been an exciting year for me personally. Next year, I believe that we have been extremely fortunate in our staff recruitment and enrolments are strong. We have more buildings to build and a number of curriculum challenges as we endeavour to cater for increased numbers whilst maintaining the strong community feel which defines the School. To those leaving the School, I wish you a fond farewell and happy memories of your time here. To those returning next year, I wish you a safe and happy holiday and look forward to sharing the adventure with you again in 2007.





Technology keeps students at the digital forefront

Gippsland Grammar is truly at the forefront providing students with opportunities to work with new and emerging technologies. Teaching methods have changed to integrate the latest technology into every lesson.

Using technology the students already know, love and understand – the computer and MP3 player - podcasting is just one of the hottest new teaching tools used in the classroom.

"It's a medium the students love and it's engaging them like never before," Principal Mike Clapper said.

"With open minds and state-of-the-art resources our teachers are able to develop innovative and stimulating lessons to cope with the ever-changing world around us."

Teachers have enjoyed introducing new and exciting ICT initiatives to students and the response has been very encouraging. A podcast is a piece of audio or a sound file which can be stored and listened to anytime via your computer or MP3 player.

Over the past year, students have made their own podcasts (in particular, one Year 7 class devised an interview with a mythical creature) which where then emailed or uploaded to the school's intranet service for the class teacher to assess.

Teachers have found that any learning situation can be supported with audio material and such material which is so portable and can be listened to anywhere or anytime is a real hit with the students.

Podcasts also form an important link between the school and the community, with parents able to listen to work the students have been doing and possibly in the future the school's weekly newsletter.

LOTE (Languages Other Than English) classes find podcasting especially helpful for

the students to record and hear their own pronunciation of the foreign tongue.

Information, Communication and Technology teacher Allyson Ferguson said this latest technology had further potential. Many class resources, assignments and homework are on-line, allowing students access from anywhere in the school, the boarding house and from home. The Intranet fosters communication between families and the school and parents can view their child's timetable and homework tasks.

To further encourage communication links, the Intranet includes school policies, weekly newsletters, school calendar and the ability for families to contact staff using email. The school Intranet is the communication hub.

"Gippsland Grammar is proud of the leadership role it has developed in ICT in the region," Mr Clapper said.

Young actor impresses professionals



"It was a privilege to watch you perform," was the feedback Gordon Meredith received from Victorian College of the Arts director, Amanda Kerr, after spending a week on scholarship with Melbourne Theatre Company.

Studying VCE Drama, Gordon was invited to take part in a week of workshops with MTC directors and actors during the September school holidays.

He described the experience as inspiring and said that now, more than ever before, he intends to strive to become a professional actor.

This is the fifth year Melbourne Theatre Company has offered such an opportunity to Victorian students.

Earlier in the year every secondary school in the state was invited to nominate one student to participate, and from the list of nominees, 24 were chosen.

This is the second year Gippsland Grammar has had a successful applicant.

The National Championships were run across the country in July, with Esther competing at Morwell's Twin City Archery Club. Scores from across the country were posted on a championship website, which determined Esther as the new champ.

Esther's win was particularly outstanding as she had beaten fourtime national champion, Jessica Walters, an Australian Institute of Sport athlete, by 40 points.

Esther was invited to join AIM Archery, a prestigious archery club at Cheltenham in 2005 and is coached by Haans Wright, who holds an Order of Australia Medal for archery. Needless to say, Haans was ecstatic with Esther's win and told her to leave school and concentrate on archery!

Esther has maintained a cool head and will complete her VCE in 2007, after which she would like to start training for world championships and the Olympic Games.

"I'd like to try for Beijing," she said.

Esther is also the 2006 Federation Internationale De Tir A L'arc (FITA) State and National Indoor Champion (U18 female Recurve), and AIM Junior Club champion (U18 female Recurve and Open class female champion).

Handcrafted woodwork on display

Gippsland Grammar Woodwork students recently exhibited their work at Esso BHP Billiton Wellington Entertainment Centre in Sale.

The display was officially opened on Friday evening by Brian (Barney) Castles who was owner/manager of the former Castles Timber and Hardware, an icon of Sale.


Mr Castles was impressed by the quality of work handcrafted by the students.

"I am delighted in this technological age to see young people enjoying themselves and producing such beautiful pieces of work from wood," he said.

Woodwork teacher, Malcolm Ralton, who has been restoring and polishing furniture for more than 40 years, said the emphasis in class was to develop the ability of the students to visualise and plan their own work and produce it using traditional skills.

"Students use mortice and tenon and rebate joints, and very few, if any, metal fixings," he explained.

"Even the mouldings are made with antique planes and all works are finished with French polish or linseed oil and beeswax."

Water tanks save water

Gippsland Grammar has been successful in obtaining two grants under the Commonwealth Government's Community Water Grants program – both for the installation of water storage tanks for storing rainwater to use for irrigating our grounds.

At the Garnsey Campus we were successful in gaining the full Community Water grant amount of \$50,000 to install 2 x 90,000 litre concrete underground tanks that have been installed on the southern side of the Chapel. Rainwater will be collected from the roofs of surrounding buildings, stored in the tanks and pumped on to the athletics track through an irrigation system that was installed in December 2004.

Assuming we get enough rain to keep a reasonable level of water in the tanks we could save in excess of 1 million litres of town water each year and also be able to maintain a good coverage of grass on the athletics track.

The grant has covered all of the additional cost incurred in relation to the installation of the tanks.

At the Bairnsdale campus it was always planned to run the rainwater from the building roof and storm water through a single drainage system so it was a relatively simple plan to divert this drainage water into $6 \ge 30,000$ litre plastic storage tanks located ideally at a low point of our block in the south-west corner.

This stored water is then pumped all around the campus to water the playing field and garden areas.

Water from the roof of future buildings will also be diverted into the tanks.

Our grant of \$41,778 covers the installation of the tanks and the watering system.

SCIENTIST VISITS SCHOOL



Old Scholar, Dr Simon Gregory, is enjoying an incredible career in genetics.

Now working in the United States as an Assistant Professor in Medical Genetics at the Duke Centre for Human Genetics, Simon was recently in Gippsland visiting family and budding scientists at Gippsland Grammar.

Simon explained that he was fortunate to join the Human Genome Project in its early stages when he coordinated the production of human sequence from chromosome 1, the largest human chromosome.

The Human Genome Project has been likened to man walking on the moon in that it's a very large one-off experiment, the likes of which has never been achieved before and will not be repeated.

"What we've done is produce a sequence over our own human genomes...it's the blueprint of life; the building blocks of who we are," he said.

Simon is now working on multiple sclerosis, heart disease and brain cancer.

He graduated from Gippsland Grammar in 1985 then attended Melbourne's RMIT where he completed a Bachelor of Science degree. He completed his PhD at the Wellcome Trust Sanger Institute.

Simon grew up in Bairnsdale and is the son of Bob and Libby Gregory.

Student leads National forum

School Captain, Erika Lind, has been identified as one of the nation's leading science students and invited to the National Youth Science Forum as a leader.

Last year she was chosen to participate in the prestigious event and as a result of her success was also selected to attend the International Youth Science Forum in London.

One of only six Australian participants, she joined 240 other students from across the globe to rub shoulders with the world's leading scientists.

Now with the London experience under her belt her ever-growing passion for science seems to be contagious.

Three other Gippsland Grammar students have been invited to take part in the National Forum which Erika will help coordinate and present.

Year 11 students Matthew Iversen, Megan Droppert and Esther Lloyd will travel to Canberra in January for the intensive twoweek forum.

Only 12 Gippsland students were chosen, and to have three of those from Gippsland Grammar is an outstanding achievement.

All the students were nominated by their local Rotary clubs. In 2005, Erika was given

the opportunity by Mitchell River Rotary Club, Bairnsdale, and now Sale and Sale Central and Maffra Rotary Clubs have nominated Esther Lloyd, Matthew Iversen and Megan Droppert respectively.

The National Youth Science Forum is a program for students who have just completed Year 11, and who are thinking about a career in Science, Engineering and Technology.

Erika said her experience had certainly sparked interests in different science-related issues and careers as well as having helped develop her confidence and communication skills.

"It really opened my eyes to the world," the Year 12 student said of her first trip overseas.

"The program involved lectures by scientists from a range of fields, site visits, social activities and excursions," she said.

"Now as a staff member at next year's Forum, I am looking forward to sharing my enthusiasm for this program with a new group of participants."

To top-off a stellar year, Erika was also awarded the Queen's Guide Award. The first to be offered in the Bairnsdale district for 20 years, the award was the culmination of community service, outdoor education and other guiding criteria. Congratulations Erika!

Lorne Cumming (1986)


