



From the Principal

In the last edition, I mentioned the important work done by various organisations connected with the School, focusing in particular on the contribution made by the School Board. Another group which is of great importance to the life of our School community is the Old Scholars' Association.

Their contribution is made in many ways. They do raise some funds and made a significant contribution to the Building Fund recently which has assisted in our ongoing capital development, including the recently opened Year 12 Centre, which you can read more about elsewhere in this issue. They also support the current students in a variety of ways and host an annual Old Scholars' Association barbecue for the Year 12s before they commence their final examinations.

Any Old Scholar is welcome to become involved with the Old Scholars' Association, which meets once a month to co-ordinate the organisation's activities, including the all-important reunions. There is also a position for one of our Old Scholars on the School Board. This position has been filled for the last nine years by Scott Rossetti (Class of '81) who has made an excellent contribution to the Board over that time, including work on our Audit Committee. This year, Scott stepped down from his position and we are delighted that Steven Scott (also Class of '81) has stepped into the breach. Steven is currently secretary of the Old Scholars' Association and played a major part in redeveloping the organisation's constitution last year.

One of the delights which I have found working at Gippsland Grammar is the real interest which many Old Scholars take in the ongoing life of the School. We regularly enrol students who are the children or grandchildren of Old Scholars. There are groups of Old Scholars who continue to meet regularly and have developed lifelong connections with each other and the School. One of these groups, the 'Green Grubs', consists of women who were at St Anne's in the 1940s and 1950s.

We live in a world in which community values continue to be eroded and young people are in danger of becoming disconnected from the world as a result. The ongoing good health of the Old Scholars is a sign that, at Gippsland Grammar, we retain our strong sense of community and I urge you to remain connected with the School and with your peers from School. We continue to be interested in the unfolding lives of our ex-students and take great pride in hearing of your achievements. We hope that Old Scholars also enjoy hearing of our current achievements and plans. Veritas is a vehicle through which much of this information can be shared and I hope that you enjoy this edition.



### HI-TECH BUILDING HONOURS GENERATIONS OF FUNDRAISERS

The capital works program at Gippsland Grammar continues, with a new \$1.6 million multi-level wing at Garnsey Campus the latest project to be completed.

Featuring additional Year 12 classrooms with large plasma screens, an advanced food technology facility, 155-seat lecture theatre and state-of-the-art canteen, the new wing was officially opened in Term 3 this

Dr Martin Kent, who has enjoyed a long association with the school as a parent and board member, including a five year stint as Board Chair, had the privilege of opening the building and publicly naming the lecture theatre, The JJAJJGAN Theatre.

It was named The JJAJJGAN Theatre after the group of women who have worked tirelessly over nearly 40 years fundraising for the school.

The JJAJJGAN group was formed in June 1968 by a group of school mothers who were finding it difficult to attend evening meetings and began gathering during school hours to raise money and collect resources for the school.

The first initial of the eight original members created the name JJAJJGAN.

They were Mesdames Jean Ashton, Jill McKinnon, Ailsa Dawkins, Jo Chomley, Jo Kent, Gwen Dumaresq, the late Audrey Davis and Nan Sargood.

Throughout generations the JJAJJGAN group has had many members and today still meets frequently and continues to donate to the school.

Tess Morrison, a current student and granddaughter of JJAJJGAN member Val Morrison, read at the opening before the Bishop of Gippsland, John McIntyre, blessed the building.

The new lecture theatre boasts a fully integrated multimedia system with podium controls, has tiered, ergonomic seating and is used for small group tutorials as well as larger year level presentations and drama and music performances.

The new commercial kitchen is fitted with selfcontained kitchen work stations and a large screen connected to overhead video offering close up views of tasks being demonstrated.

The cafeteria has a healthy choice menu encouraging students to maintain a healthy and active lifestyle. It operates using a unique cashless payment system, like a debit ID card, and is able to store special dietary requirements and allergy information for individual students.

Principal Mike Clapper said the entire school community was excited about the completion of these most recent capital works.

"In the past three years Gippsland Grammar has undergone significant changes," he explained.


"We established a new junior campus in Bairnsdale, constructed a fantastic new facility for our preschoolers (three to five years) in Sale at the Junior School, extended and upgraded assembly halls, renovated the senior science wing and now completion of this latest project has students, teachers and parents alike buzzing with excitement." Because of this most recent upgrade the school now offers an even wider range of courses.

VET (Vocational Education and Training) subjects in Multimedia, Music Industry Skills, Hospitality and Information Technology/Software Applications are now components in the curriculum.

Future plans include construction of an Early Learning Centre in Bairnsdale by the end of this school year as well as additional classrooms.

Boarding facilities are also scheduled for a major

### Pam Seidel

Former staff member, Pam Seidel passed away on 17 March 2007. Students from the 1970s and early 1980s would certainly remember Mrs Seidel as a teacher of Science and Biology. Pam was co-author of *Science to Sixteen*, which was published by Oxford Univeristy Press (Australia) in 1980. These texts were used by STAGGS for science theory and practical work.

In the 1980s, Pam organised annual science excursions to numerous academic and



industrial sites in Melbourne. These two-day trips involved many of her Year 11 students.

Pam was ahead of her time and was known for her innovative ideas on conservation. She lived at Calulu near Bairnsdale in a home fully powered by 32 volts from solar panels and a wind generator, built by her husband

Warren. Ironing was only done on very windy days!

Pam left STAGGS in 1983 to become Senior Mistress and Head of Science at Nagle College in Bairnsdale.
