Looking back just two years to the first edition of Veritas for 2006, we focused on the opening of our new campus in Bairnsdale and celebrated that, with this new campus, we had reached a record enrolment of 875 students. As we begin 2008, we celebrate the opening of the second major building at the new campus, which has now reached an enrolment of over 100, bringing the total School enrolment to over 950 students, with a further 100 students involved in the Early Learning Program across both campuses.

The second building has a similar external design to the first, but internally is quite

different. It incorporates the Early Learning Centre and three classrooms for the youngest grades Prep, 1 and 2. The building has some innovative features including a new lighting system which is cool to touch and highly energy efficient. This supports the environmentally friendly philosophy which the whole campus has embraced.

Meanwhile, at the St Anne's Junior School, we were delighted that in 2008, for the first time, we have two classes in Prep. This has been an objective since we started planning the new Early Learning Centre and the strong program at the ELC has certainly been a contributing factor as well as the very successful transition program which we introduced last year. Obviously if we are able to sustain this level of enrolment in prep, there will need to be some expansion at the Campus over the next few years.

We are about to begin the

major renovation of the St Anne's Library which was first mooted quite a few years ago and for which quite considerable funding has been raised. The current project is somewhat different from the original plan, but will be no less spectacular. It involves extending the existing Library in two different directions, including knocking down the corridor between the Flinders and Paterson classrooms and the Library and including this space and the current outdoor space within the main Library room. The current Paterson room will become the computer centre and will open directly off the library and Flinders will become the long awaited staffroom. Eventually, the canteen will be relocated into the old staffroom. The building will include some spectacular skylights and some ramps and decking which will improve ease of access and provide a much more attractive exterior. The main Library room will almost double in size to a space of about 200m2 and the total project cost is about \$300 000. Work will begin on the project in the Term 1 holidays and will be completed by the beginning of Term 3.

Future developments at the Junior School hinge on the relocation of the Boarding House which we hope will occur before the end of this year. This will allow for the relocation of some of the specialist facilities into what is currently the girls boarding area,

We continue to enjoy very strong enrolments in the Senior School and good VCE results, but the long term future stability of the School depends on strengthening our Junior School enrolments to ensure continuity into Year 7. I am sure that these developments at the two Junior Campuses will provide significant support in achieving this objective.

Tisdall Hotham won the Junior School Interhouse Swimming Carnival after a 21 year drought! The House Captains were tremendously proud of their team's wonderful result, beating Blundell Bogong which came second, closely followed by Cranswick Dargo and Wellington Binks.

At Senior School, Cranswick Dargo continued their domination of the event, winning their eleventh consecutive Interhouse Swimming Carnival. On this huge day of competition, 7 records were broken:

Two crews from Gippsland Grammar competed at the Australian Rowing Championships, held at the Sydney International Regatta Centre at Penrith Lakes in NSW. Our senior boys' crew comprised Dan Candy, Craig Battams, Jordan Smith and Stephen Johnston with Georgia Banks as cox. The intermediate crew members were Lester Goold, Jackson Harrison, James Gray, Jack Joyce and cox Derek Mwagiru.

Our Intermediate crew competed in the Under 17 coxed quad scull event where they came third in their heat and first in their repechage to gain a place in the semi-final. After a good race in the semi-final they gained a very creditable fourth place to narrowly miss out on a place in the final. There were 21 crews in this event and the medallists in the final were all composite sports academy crews.

The senior boys competed in the Under 19 double scull and the schoolboy open coxed quad scull.

In the Under 19 double scull Dan Candy

and Stephen Johnston were eliminated after the repechage round. Although they performed well, a lack of combined experience contributed to their early departure from this event.

The stronger and more experienced combination of Craig Battams and Jordan Smith raced very well to gain entry to the final with the second fastest qualifying times. In their doubles final they led for the first half of the race. Their inability to settle down in the middle of the race allowed more experienced crews to row through them. They missed out on the bronze medal by the narrowest of margins. This was an outstanding performance in a large and experienced field of 23 crews.

The senior boys competed in the Australian Champion Schoolboy coxed quad scull event. In this event they won their heat comfortably to progress straight to the A Final. In the A final they rowed a perfect race plan to go through the 500m marker in fourth, the 1000m in third, the 1500m in second and moved to the lead in the final 500m, winning by over 2 seconds.

This is the first time any school from outside the main rowing centres of Melbourne, Geelong and Ballarat have won a National Championship in Rowing. This achievement reflects Gippsland Grammar's significant commitment not only to rowing, but to providing students with the same opportunities as the much larger Melbourne schools. One of the most limiting factors in providing for the number of students who wish to row is a lack of local coaches. I would be delighted to hear from anyone who has had rowing experience and may be interested in getting involved in rowing locally.

Rowing Victoria has proposed that the entire senior boys' quad be sent to the National Junior Selection Trial in Sydney from 11 to 13 April. This proposal has now been ratified by Rowing Australia. It is a great achievement for them to have been selected to attend the trials based on their gold medal prognostic times recorded in Sydney.


Enhancement studies
