

Another year is drawing rapidly to a close, and for Gippsland Grammar it has been an eventful one. For our Old Scholars, there has been a number of exciting events, including several reunions, most notably the delightful Wheelbarrow's Birthday event which brought together many of the St Anne's Boarders from the 40s and 50s. There were two catalysts for this event - firstly, the memorable speech by Marie Potter at our St Anne's Day and secondly the opening of our new Blackwood House boarding facility, which many of the Old Girls were keen to see, and perhaps to compare enviously with the rather Spartan accommodation of the war and immediate post-war years. The event



was a great success and we are keen to make it an annual event.

Another important event was the opening of the renovated Junior School Library, by retiring Head of Junior School, Mr Garry Gray. It was a delight also to see previous Principal Jim Beard, and previous Bishop of Gippsland, the Right Reverend Arthur Jones, at this event. Other facilities which have been completed this year include a new Technical Production Studio at the Garnsey Campus and the refurbishment of the Year 9 common room.

Our Year 12 Valedictory this year was a special event. This year's group has shown particularly strong leadership and I feel optimistic about their upcoming results. I hope they will have been inspired by our guest speaker, Lindsay Tanner, Dux of Gippsland Grammar in 1973 and now Minister for Finance and Deregulation. Whilst acknowledging that there were some aspects of his schooling that he remembers less than fondly, Lindsay spoke warmly of the School's powerfully positive value system, which included a zero tolerance of racism in all its forms. Lindsay, who is of a similar generation to me, spoke of the events which transpired in the late 1960s and early 1970s which were, to quite a significant extent, shaped by the ideals of young people of that generation. He urged young people to continue to have high ideals, and we certainly hope that, as a School, we play our part in challenging students to reflect on important issues and to be a part of a new generation of idealists, who will in turn play their part in shaping a positive future for the nation.

This year, our St Anne's Campus loses a number of familiar faces. Apart from Mr Gray, who leaves us after 12 years as Head of Junior School, we farewell Jeanette Roberts, who has served the School for 21 years and Di Rowarth who has been with us for nearly 25 years. Their contribution to the School was celebrated at a special fellowship on November 20th and the high esteem in which both are held was evident in the reaction of both staff and students at this event. We thank them for their loyal service and wish them well in their futures.

# SPORT STARS SHINE

2008 has been a big year in sport! A large number of our students have competed in School teams, individually and through local sporting clubs in their chosen sports. Through information provided by the students and staff members, we have compiled this report of some outstanding sporting efforts and results.

#### **ROWING**

We started the year with the wonderful news that our senior boys had won the Australian Champion Schoolboy coxed quad scull event, at Penrith Lakes in NSW. It was the first time any school from outside the main rowing centres of Melbourne, Geelong or Ballarat had won a National Championship in Rowing. Team members were Craig Battams, Dan Candy and Jordan Smith (Year 12), Stephen Johnston (Year 11) and Georgia Banks (Year 10 – cox). Our Intermediate coxed quad scull crew came fourth in their U17 final, which was a commendable result.

# TRACK, FIELD & POOL

Mia Ross (Year 7) competed at the National Secondary School cross country championships in the Victorian team. The U13 girls won their age group event and Mia went on to win the 1500m time trial. Mia also finished third in the 800m at the Victorian All-Schools Track and Field Championships with a time of 2min 23sec.

Tonilee Pelz (Year 10) placed fifth in the 400m at the Victorian Track and Field Championships with a time of 60:22sec.



At the Victorian All-Schools Track Relays at Olympic Park, our girls performed particularly well. The U16 Girls team of Mia Ross, Tess Morrison, Amy Harrison and Maddie Walker won Bronze in the 4 x 800m and the U20 Girls team of Sarah Crowe, Tonilee Pelz, Tara Snelling and Maddi Barnett won Bronze in the 4 x 400m.

Five of our students will compete at the Pacific School Games in Canberra this year. These games are an international sporting event for primary and secondary students aged ten to nineteen, and are considered to be the flagship event of School Sport Australia. Competitors come from every Australian State and Territory as well as from over twenty countries, largely from the Pacific. Sarah Trett (Year 7) will compete in Shot Put, Gordon Meredith (Year 12) will play Hockey and Sarah Crowe (Year 12), Jeremy Meyer (Year 11) and Elliot Shaw (Year 8) have been selected to compete in the swimming events.

Jeremy Meyer was the 'Gippstar' winner for the month of October this year. He has produced some outstanding results, including having competed at the Junior World Swimming Championships in Mexico, where he placed 8th in the final of the 200m Breaststroke. Jeremy is the current Victorian Open 200m Breaststroke champion and the Australian age champion in the same event. Jeremy has been chosen in the squad for the Junior Pan-Pacific Championships in Guam next January and was delighted to be named the Gippsland Junior Sportsperson of 2008.

### **AFL**

The School is proud to announce that two students have been drafted to the AFL for 2009

Nick Heyne (Year 12) has been drafted to the St Kilda Football Club, following an impressive local football career. Nick played for Gippsland Power and was a member of the U17 AIS/AFL team which toured South Africa in April. He also captained the Victorian Country Team this year. Campbell Heath (Year 11) has been drafted by the Sydney Swans Football Club.
Campbell will complete his Year 12 studies in 2009, training with the club during holidays and around his School schedule.
He has played for Gippsland Power and was a member of the Country Victorian team this year.

John Butcher (Year 11) and Koby Stevens (Year 11) are also making their mark on the game. John played in the U17 AIS/ AFL team with Nick Heyne this year and will continue to play for Gippsland Power in 2009. Koby Stevens plays for Gippsland Power and Country Victoria, has been named in the U17 All-Australian team and is an AIS Football Scholar. John and Koby should proceed to the AFL draft next year and the School will monitor their progress with great interest.


#### **MARTIAL ARTS**

### **BOXING**

We have two new Australian Champions at the School in the interesting sport of Women's Boxing. Louise Irvine and Meg Cameron (both Year 10) competed in the

U17 Australian Women's Championships in July, with outstanding results. Meg won the 54kg division and Louise won the 60kg division in the championship round. It was a tremendous result for the two Bairnsdale girls, with their coach reporting that both have a great deal of potential in this emerging sport.

#### **BASKETBALL**

Year 7 boys, Jake Horstman, Harry Thackray and James Whelan, played for the Maffra Basketball Club at the National Club Championships tournament in Darwin this year. Jake (U15) and James (U14) now play for Country Victorian teams.

## **SAILING**

Breanna Collins (Year 10) was part of the winning crew at the 2008 Australian Women's Keelboat Championships. Breanna sailed in the Women's Elliott Regatta in September with her own boat, crew and sponsor and is now sponsored by the East Gippsland Sports Foundation. She regularly crews on 50ft maxi yacht, Galaxy, off Williamstown and hopes to compete in the Sydney to Hobart race once she turns 18.

**Just over 50 Old Scholars** who boarded at St Anne's **Church of England Girls** Grammar School in the 40s and 50s, celebrated Wheelbarrow's Birthday on Friday 10 October. The idea for a reunion was mooted at St Anne's Day celebrations in July this year, when Marie Potter (nee Lang) from Bairnsdale, was the guest speaker at Fellowship at the St Anne's Campus.

Who is Wheelbarrow? Marie addressed those who gathered at the new boarding facilities for the reunion, and filled us in on the beginning of this tradition, as follows:

Years ago, birthdays were celebrated by boarders at their own particular table in the dining room, usually with a cake and other goodies sent in by parents. Marie Potter's table felt that they needed another birthday to celebrate, and as Enid Brenton had a pin in her hand, she stuck it into a calendar, and it landed on 10 October. They then tried to locate someone whose birthday fell on that date, but failing to do so, decided they would invent a birthday, and so "Wheelbarrow's Birthday" was selected.
