Lachlan Evans, our Dux of 2011 (with an entry score of 99.45) received an award for English, in which he received a 'perfect' score of 50. 
The 2012 J.A.T Beard Travel Scholarship

Each year, the Foundation supports staff personal development and training through the funding of the J.A.T Beard Travel Scholarship. The NOLS offers students the opportunity to learn a range of new skills and receive up to date information on leadership and communication, alpine rescue, environmental studies, risk management and outdoor skills.

Michelle's funding enabled her to attend the Speech Pathology Australia National Conference, held in Tasmania in the June holidays. This was an opportunity for Michelle to attend a series of seminars and to network with other Speech Pathologists. Michelle is keen to share her newfound knowledge with teachers of students with a range of presenting conditions and difficulties which impact directly upon their ability to function within a classroom.

This year, the Mathematics Department has been successful in gaining funding to have Old Scholar, Dr Alex Hua (2004) visit the School in Term 3 to enhance the teaching and learning experience of senior mathematics students. Alex achieved a perfect 50 in Specialist Mathematics in Year 12 and went on to study Medicine at Melbourne University. He has a Bachelor of Medicine, Bachelor of Surgery and Bachelor of Medical Science and is a former member of the Australian Maths Olympiad Team. Alex will work with Year 11 and 12 students on specific topics within both Maths Methods and Specialist Maths. The project aims to provide students with a deep knowledge of the concepts underpinning the course and alternative perspectives on these topics.

Top Science Student

A thirst for knowledge and a passion for Science will see Year 12 student, Matisse Valette attend an international Science forum this year. Matisse attended the National Youth Science Forum (NYSF) in January and has now been selected to attend the prestigious Euroscience Open Forum in Dublin.

To obtain a place at the NYSF, Matisse competed against over 2000 applicants from around the country, demonstrating exceptional levels of interest, capacity and potential in fields of Science, along with strong teamwork, communication and leadership skills.

Matisse is one of only six Australian students selected to travel to Dublin for this once in a lifetime opportunity. He will meet with other young, talented scientists from around the globe, and broaden his scientific and cultural perspectives.

Before departing, Matisse faced the difficult task of fundraising to cover his travel costs. Members of the wider

Students at Gippsland Grammar marked National Reconciliation Week with several events added to the School's calendar.

This year's Reconciliation Week commemorated two significant milestones in the reconciliation journey - the anniversaries of the successful 1967 referendum and the High Court Mabo decision. The theme of this year's national event was 'Let's Talk Recognition' with a focus on how Australians can better recognise each other, and recognise the contributions, cultures and histories of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Staff and students endeavoured to use the events of the week to learn about our shared histories, cultures and achievements and to explore how we can contribute to the National Reconciliation effort.

The Bairnsdale Campus conducted a 'Sorry Day' fellowship at which the Reverend Tony Wicking spoke of the importance of reconciliation in the Christian tradition. The students were also fortunate to have a visit from Cultural Infusion's Warramar Man, who focussed on developing understanding and cultural harmony through stories and performance.

The Garnsey Campus Chaplaincy committee ran a barbecue for students, at which Nick Moffatt presented the Welcome to Country, and Rich Lanham from St Paul's Cathedral spoke of his experiences and understanding of reconciliation.

During the week we were pleased to welcome Nick and Phillip Moffatt who attended School chapel services and we were also fortunate to hear from Reverend Kathy Dalton, whose personal story helped students recognise that we each have a responsibility to open our hearts and minds to reconciliation.

The School thanked its indigenous students, who also contributed by sharing a prayer for reconciliation at the barbecue and Chapel services.

This was an important week for all members of the School community and Gippsland Grammar was proud to be part of the reconciliation journey of our nation.

Sound experience for students

Students from our VET Music Industry class put all their skills to the test in April, when they took on the huge task of setting up and operating Gippsland Grammar's sound system at Kernott Hall for the 125th Anniversary Ball for the Catholic Diocese of Sale. Over five hundred tickets for the event were sold, giving the students a rare opportunity to work with a big band, as well as with star performer, Rhonda Burchmore.

Under the direction of teacher Paul Van Eekelen, the students were required to set up a sound system to cover the big band's 9-piece horn section, full rhythm section and lead vocalists. The whole project was part of their School Assessed Coursework (SAC), which requires students to set up and operate a professional PA system for a medium sized venue.

Following Ms Burchmore's performance, staff from Gippsland Grammar's Music Department, led by Brad Cruickshank, took to the stage alongside other local professional musicians, in the big band, *Bandera*. Mr Cruickshank was in charge of the musical entertainment for the evening and also needed a top sound crew for the job.

Teacher, Mr Paul Van Eekelen said, "When Brad offered us the gig, knowing that the School had the appropriate equipment, I suggested that the VET students could work on the night and use the experience as part of their SAC work. I had every confidence that the students would do a fantastic job – and they did."

The Certificate III in Music Industry (Technical Production) offered by the School, carries full weight as a VCE subject. It provides students with a wide range of knowledge and skills to be able to work in the music industry, in a wide variety of music technology and related fields. The course is focused on live performance audio technology and audio recording technology.

Cultural Trips

Incredible India 2012

During the April School holidays, a group of Gippsland Grammar staff and associates travelled to India for a two week tour, organised and led by our Head of Science, Sanjeev Meston. Also on tour were former staff member, Shayne Boyd and her husband George, and five staff members from Flinders Christian College. The following report was contributed by staff member, Helen Drew, who travelled to India with her husband, Lindsay.

On arrival in Delhi, no time was wasted as we cashed up with rupees and headed off in auto rickshaws to explore the markets and begin to take in the colours, sights (and smells) which make India what it is.

Most of the trip was by bus driven in typical Indian fashion, in and out of traffic, dodging cars, cows, carts, camels, trucks, other buses, dogs, people, and anything else which strayed onto the road. The constant tooting from our bus

roads are generally rough and narrow, which made for some interesting passing moves. The weather was mostly very hot but intriguingly we didn't get sunburnt. The food and flavours were at times testing, but apart from a few being ill during the final part of the trip, most escaped unscathed.

As well as Delhi, the trip included visiting the cities of Agra, Ranthambore, Jaipur, Jodphur and Udaipur located in the state of Rajasthan and Rishikesh and Mussoorie in the state of Uttarakhand. There were many highlights, including the Red Fort, the Taj Mahal, Agra Fort, Fatehphur Sikri and Ranthambore National Park where we did see a tiger in the wild. We also enjoyed an elephant ride to the Amber Fort in Jaipur and visited the Mehrangarh Fort in Jodphur. It was then on to Udaipur City Palace and a boat ride on Lake Pichola. Our group also toured the Ganges River and surrounds at Rishikesh and Mussoorie, where we were guests of the Wynberg Allen School where Sanjeev used to teach. A favourite of many was the fabulous market shopping where the art of bartering was constantly tested.

The trip has many lasting memories for us all and gave us a much greater appreciation of this amazing country. We would like to thank Sanjeev for organising the tour and recommend that a trip to India is a must for all.
