Students Impress in ANZAC Tour

GIPPSLAND Grammar musicians impressed crowds during special overseas Anzac commemoration services in April.

Our senior band and choir performed throughout France and Belgium as part of a 10-day trip culminating with extra special performances at the famous Last Post Ceremony at the Menin Gate Memorial, Belgium, and the Dawn Service in the Buttes New British Cemetery, Polygon Wood on ANZAC Day.

"It was a fantastic event to be a part of," Year 11 student and tenor saxophone player Andrew Crawford said. "To rub shoulders with dignitaries and military officers is an experience I'm not going to forget anytime soon."

The Australian Embassy to Belgium said the Anzac service was sombre and described it as 'incredibly moving'.

"Today, we honour the values that have been invested in the original ANZACs - loyalty, selflessness, courage," an embassy spokesman said. "Very special to have the Dawn Service supported by local buglers and a performance by Australian school Gippsland Grammar. A privilege for us to witness their talents."

The inaugural ANZAC Music and Language Tour was a lifechanging experience for the 46 students participating.

Year 8 student Hudson Ray-Daminato, who sings in Choir and plays percussion in the band, said the journey had personal significance.

"My two-times great uncle, Henry James Bird, was an ANZAC soldier in the battle of Somme in World War 1," Hudson said. "My research found multiple letters to and from his family, which we personally possess a war letter from 1916. Henry always signed off his letters with 'from your loving brother/son Henry xxxx.' He was popular with his peers and remembered for his fearless dedication to his duty."

Director of Performing Arts Dr Kevin Cameron said the tour presented an unsurpassed opportunity for students to learn through the lenses of music, culture and language.

"The Tour helped students understand what others have sacrificed in war for them," Dr Cameron said. "To learn the price of service and to glimpse the greatness that collaboration and commitment through music can bring to the individual and the community.

The tour also included concerts in Paris and visits to a number of locations with a significant historical significance to Australians including Amiens, Bullecourt, Fromelles and Pozieres.

Head of Languages Sonia Duggan, who was born in France, said students performing at the French national anthem 'La Marseillaise' at the Arc de Triomphe, Paris, was a trip highlight for her

"It was a very special moment to witness our Gippsland Grammar students at such a significant location playing such a significant piece of music. Very special, indeed," she said. "It's great to have international travel back on the calendar at Gippsland Grammar."

More than 70 senior students were involved in the production either on the stage, in the orchestra or behind the scenes with auditions being held in late 2022 and rehearsals including a three-day 'January intensive' before building up to three times a week as opening night drew closer.

Annie director and Drama teacher Christina Kyriakou said that while the commitment required for a school production shouldn't be taken lightly, the rewards were great.

"A production such as this creates an inclusive environment where students come together and share in a common goal," Ms Kyriakou said. "Students nurture each another and leaders emerge all the time. We have Year 11 students working with Year 8 students to choreograph numbers, and small groups of cross-age students work on scenes and sing next to each other. A production becomes like a family where everyone is appreciated and valued no matter how much experience they have had."

Director of Performing Arts Dr Kevin Cameron agreed a highlight of production such as *Annie* was how it brought the School Community together.

"Our students have the opportunity to develop their creativity, collaboration, technical and interpretative skills across so many aspects of their art forms," Dr Cameron said. "Importantly, we

have the opportunity to bring our parents, families, and wider community to our school to enjoy the making of these special memories and formative experiences that can be life changing for our students."

Year 11 student Henry Storer (pictured) has been involved in Garnsey productions since he was in Year 9 and was the student in charge of lighting for Annie, which meant he was based at the lighting desk running lighting cues as well as running the backstage projections.

"Working alongside everyone in the productions is always a pleasure," Henry said. "And I have always loved seeing the production come together."



"We encourage the children to reflect on how lucky they are to have a home, warm clothes, education, loving families and food," Mrs Burgess said. "Children



Equestrian

GIPPSLAND Grammar's equestrian team is gearing up for the nationals following great success.

At the Victorian Interschool Championships Year 9 rider Annabelle Webb (second from the left) qualified for the nationals. Annabelle was one of our School's top riders whose scores were calculated to create a School team, which placed overall third.

Annabelle teamed with Xanthe Wade (Year 8), Emily Wagstaff (Year 7), and Jack Gilbert (Year 2), to take third place at the State titles held in the April school holidays. Initially, the association awarded Gippsland Grammar second place, however a re-count confirmed

Toorak College won with 545.5 points, Tintern Grammar was second with 513.5 and Gippsland Grammar placed third with 492. Regardless, it's a great result. Together they competed across different disciplines including showjumping, sport horse, dressage, combined training and show horse, along with 460-odd other riders and 628 horses from across the state at the National Equestrian Centre in Werribee.

Siblings Mitch (Year 1) and Lachy (Year 2) Black, also qualified and participated in the highly regarded event. Lachy has since gone on to win the Interschool Showjump series day held at Boneo and champion of the day at the Victoria Equestrian Interschool grandfinal. He also came overall third and fourth in the freshman level for the entire series.



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In other news:

Xanthe Wade (right) is one of two Australian riders chosen to participate in the France leg of the Global Amateur Junior Show Jump Tour. Xanthe will fly to Paris on June 30

Riders with an appropriate skill level and competition results were invited to apply. Xanthe said the experience would include high performance training (in a foreign country, on a borrowed horse with an international coach), educational sessions and rider fitness and would culminate in a competition and a visit to the Olympic Centre being built for the Paris event next year. The 14-year-old said she was looking forward to meeting riders from other countries and the possibility of creating a steppingstone to future international riding.

Only 12 riders (from Canada, Japan, USA, New Zealand and Australia) will take part.

And the Year 8 student has also just beer invited to Bath, UK, in August for the Laser Run World Championships after a strong performances at the Australian Modern Pentathlon Championships in Melbourne and the National Laser Run Championships in Sydney. Laser Run is the running and shooting phase of modern pentathlon and Xanthe will compete in the under 15 section.
